Restoring a Growler to its Glory Days

What is a Growler: Nick Nicholas and Mike Bender put out a good YouTube on Restoring a Model T Generator and another one on Restoring a Model T Starter. They define a growler as an electrical device used for testing insulation of an armature for a short.

- The alternating magnetic flux set up by the growler passes through the windings of the armature coil generating an alternating voltage in the coil. A short in the coil creates a closed circuit that will act like the secondary coil of a transformer, with the growler acting like the primary coil.
- This will induce an alternating current in the shorted armature that will in turn cause an alternating magnetic field to encircle the shorted armature coil.
- A flat, broad, flexible piece of metal containing iron is used to detect the magnetic field generated by a shorted armature.

• A hacksaw blade is commonly used as a feeler.

Using a Continuity Test to Determine the condition of the Armature:

- A continuity tester is used to determine if an electrical path can be established between two points.
- The armature is good if there is no continuity between the segment and the commutator.
- As with the growler, each segment must be checked.

This guy restored a growler, and it looks very similar to the Allen Electric E-32, that I used. I suggest watching the video prior to using the growler.

What motivated me to seek out a growler?

By the end of the Brenham day tour the starter on the 1922 Touring stopped working.

Additionally, the generator stopped putting out any amps. To troubleshoot both, there was a need to determine what parts are causing issues, and a growler was the best solution for testing the armature.

Not having a growler in my back pocket, a message was put on the GroupMe application to see if anyone in the club had a growler.

Dave Lucas responded and said he had one somewhere in his shop but had never used it, and knew at a minimum, it needed to a new electrical cord.

The is the growler opened for the first time exposing old wiring some of which had been replaced before. On some of the cords, the exterior insulation was



falling off to the touch.

First, I need to explain, I am not an electrical engineer. So, I am scratching my head trying to understand the wiring. Google searches for wiring diagrams failed me. And searches for Allen Electric & Equipment found no manuals online for the E-32 model. It appears Allen went out of business in the 70s. I guess that was before the internet.

When all else fails, dive in headfirst ... what is the worst that could happen? Step one,

replace the power cord.
Dave provided a power cord.
Connect the black wire to the switch where the black wire from the old power cord was attached.



Next, connect the white neutral wire to all the neutral wires. But wait, this power cord has a green ground wire (the previous cord didn't have a ground wire). Seems like it would be good to modernize the device by connecting the ground wire for safety. After all, in the early 1900s nothing was grounded.

Spoiler Alert ... grounding was a really bad idea!

Second, let's replace the wiring to the probes for the commutator testing (Continuity Test). I had some old computer power cords laying around waiting to be repurposed. A snip here, a solder there, done. To connect wires from the



switch to the new wires rather than using a wire nut, a modern GKEEMARS wire connector was used (the gray things seen in the picture – on one the orange levers can be seen).



Put the cover on and test. With the armature on the growler the power switch was flipped on and the growling started. Using a

metallic blade, no shorts were found. The starter armature passes test one.



Second test –
Continuity Test:
Turn on the
switch, place one
probe on the
armature shaft
and ... now for
the promised

spoiler alert ... sparks fly and the house electrical breaker trips!

Reset the breaker and notice the light is on (to see the light you look through the holes on the right side. The light being on is a failing condition, but the probes are not touching anything yet.

Again, touch the probe to the armature shaft and the electrical breaker trips. It has now been proven the process is repeatable.

Time to consult with my partners in crime, Dave Lucas, Anthony Marino, Bobby Wright and Denny Irvine. I sent the video to them, and they are as perplexed as me. Turning to the MTFCA Forum, I searched for growlers and nothing helpful was found. So, I made a post on the MTFCA forum, and James Bartsch replied and said some people would connect the ground wire to the frame and make the frame hot. James nicely said connecting the ground wire was not to be done.

Anthony did find some instructions for how to use the growler and emailed those to me. With the advice from James and the instructions from Anthony, I mustered up a shot of courage, disconnected the ground wire and performed the continuity test. Whew, no sparks. Even better, no light. The continuity test passes. Two down, one to go.

The amps test is the last test. It is generally a simple test, turn on the growler, and place the contacts of the probe on two bars (my word



necessarily correct) of the commutator at a time and look for an amp reading. Moving one bar over and repeat until all fields are tested. No movement

should be seen on the meter. Turn the knob to adjust the rheostat and nothing happens, additionally there is no resistance when turning the knob.

I flip over the unit over and hear something loose in the rheostat housing. A dab of JB Weld to the rescue and the rheostat is working. Performed a successful amp test.




The starter armature passes all 3 growler tests.



Directions to Demeris BBQ

From the east or west on I-10 or the south side of downtown, take the I-610 West Loop North and get off at the 18th Street Exit. Demeris BBQ will be immediately on the right after Houston Garden Nursery.
